

About the Program

Why is it important to share the stories of others? The students in Ms. Fahy's Class 5–209 embarked on an in–depth project to understand the experiences of refugees. The class read the book *Stormy Seas: Stories of Young Boat Refugees* by Mary Beth Leatherdale which told five true tales of young people who left their homes, setting sail in search of asylum.

Students began by imagining what one item they would take with them if they had to leave their homes in an emergency. During two virtual visits to the class, author Mary Beth Leatherdale had students read the refugees' stories aloud. She described how she hoped the book would bring awareness to the very difficult circumstances refugees face. She used vivid details about their experiences to help the students empathize with the hardships of others around the world.





In small groups, students researched refugee crises in Haiti, Venezuela, and Afghanistan. They learned that refugees flee their home countries to escape a combination of war, natural disaster, hunger, and political unrest.

The class was visited by Hafza Girdap of Advocates of Silenced Turkey, a human rights organization working for persecuted people in Turkey and abroad. Hafza shared the challenges immigrants and refugees face adapting to their new host countries.

The class worked with Behind the Book writing coaches to craft their research notes into compelling essays on the refugee crisis in their chosen countries. With Behind the Book teaching artist Maria Tapia, students created a paper suitcase that they could fill with items most important to them.







Motivated by their new understanding of the refugee crisis, the students visited other classes to describe what they learned about the plight of refugees and to ask for donations. On their own initiative, they continued fundraising by staffing a table in the school lobby and visiting the middle–school students. They organized a run on the school track, soliciting donations for each lap completed. The class surpassed their goals and raised over \$1,300 for the International Rescue Committee (IRC) which helps people survive and rebuild their lives in crisis areas.

Their efforts were recognized by Milagros Cruz of the IRC who visited with the class to express the organization's appreciation and to describe their work. Sharing the stories of refugees all around the world through their reading, research, and art were powerful tools for Class 5–209, sparking a desire to help others through enthusiastic fundraising efforts and educating people about these humanitarian disasters.

The International Refugee Committee (IRC) is an organization that helps refugees around the world by raising awareness about the crisis. They donate the money they raise to the refugees. They are also partnering with Behind The Book. Behind the Book goes into schools and introduces authors to kids. The books they choose often have to do with important issues like this. We read a book called <u>Stormy Seas</u> and met the author, Mary Beth Leatherdale. She wrote about the experiences of refugees around the world. We decided that we wanted to help these people out. We made our school community aware of the crisis and raised over \$1,000 that we are donating to the IRC.

One way we can help refugees is by telling them all about their new country. We can show them where to find food, shelter and clothing. We can help them find jobs, and learn how to use the money of this country. Another way to help a refugee is to NOT ask painful questions. They might not want to talk about their experience.
